## **Rethinking Contemporaneity in Contemporary Dance**

## The Performance (of) Contemporaneity: Between Eschatology and Epistemology

How do we think contemporaneity through performance? How do we think performance within contemporaneity? What is the protagonist's understanding of production conditions that influence his/her existence? What importance does she/he attach to own's acting (and is it acting at all, or a work and/or labour)? What position performance takes and what role it (might) have in the time of potential return of the big ideological confrontations shaped by attempts of equalization of fascism and antifascism, radical equality and radical inequality, the radical good and the radical evil?
